Introduction

After the resounding success of the First International Women's Conference in June 2005, the Second International Women's Conference was held on the 8th, 9th and 10th of June 2007, at the Art of Living International Headquarters in Bangalore, India.

In Sanskrit, Shakti means the driving force behind creation. It represents the eternal feminine principle. And is instrumental in positive social transformation. The theme of this year's conference was the three Shaktis: Icha Shakti or Strength in Will, Kriya Shakti or Strength in Action and Gyana Shakti or Strength in Knowledge. The 2nd International Women's Conference brought together women from all walks of life and many different organizations; from over 50 countries from First Ladies to Ministers to Mayors to Members of Parliament to social reformers and women from the villages of India and Africa. The 2nd International Women's Conference was partnered by the International Association for Human Values and Ved Vignan Maha Vidya Peeth, VISTA India (Value Integrated Services to All Women), UNIFEM and Femina India, organizations that have promoted and supported women's issues for many years.

As technology shrinks the world and spirituality helps unite ideologies, women are beginning to lead the way to new a tomorrow. The conference echoed this sentiment and showcased feminine leadership in a variety of fields. For three days women shared their stories, inspired each other and, created an action plan to help empower women across the globe. Celebration, sharing, caring and service were the hallmarks of this event.

The discussions on day 1 emphasized Iccha Shakti or Strength in Will. The atmosphere of the conference was set the first day as a strong bond and a determination to create a will that would encourage all women to participate in global transformation developed between the participants. The Conference was inaugurated by H.H. Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, founder of the Art of Living and the International Association for Human Values ,Mrs. Shiranthi **Rajapakse**, the First Lady of Sri Lanka and Mrs. Sarojni Jugnauth, the First Lady of Mauritius.



I naugural Address by His Holiness Sri Sri Ravi Shankar

In India the earth is called "Mother Earth"; you don't call it Father Earth. Mother Earth is in danger; the environment is in real danger today. We all have to put our minds together, our ideas together to find out how we can save our environment, how we can reduce pollution and of course how more and more women can represent our society in all fields of life. Though there is a positive trend, it is far from satisfactory. So, when we all sit together to discuss, that is *Gnana* Shakti, and when we make the commitment to do something about it, that is *Iccha* Shakti, then move on to action or *Kriya* Shakti.



Every conference should have two aspects. One is a discussion, brain storming session, but often conferences end where they begin. I know this conference will not end that way, but will end with an action plan. There should be an action plan made in every corner of the globe. What is it that we can do? How can we reduce domestic violence? How can we contribute towards educating the girl child? What about human rights violation? Wherever that happens, please step up, speak openly and suggest solutions as to how women from all over the world can join together to make their voices heard, to join hands and strengthen their resolve to achieve their goals. That would be very productive and useful. And during these deliberations have some fun as well!

Good ideas come to you when you are relaxed. For your intuition to be heightened, for the *Gnana* Shakti, *Iccha* Shakti, *Kriya* Shakti to be evoked in you, you need to be relaxed. You may think it strange, how you can relax when there are problems and issues to be resolved? I tell you, that is the skill in action, that is spiritual strength; to be relaxed when you are faced with a problem. It is then that you can think of ideas, when you need to be relaxed and when you can come back to your Self.

Women have silent, quiet strength and power. Do not wait to be given power, assume it. Unfortunately most of the feminine movements today are demanding rights. From whom are you demanding? You are asking from an empty chair, you have equal rights, own it, you simply have to assert your rights, you don't have to go and ask somebody, it is all there for you.

Indian Mythology has placed tremendous amount of power in women. In fact, power is equivalent to women. The power or the Shakti is the life force behind the whole creation. Each one of you is power, and you have all come together; so bring prosperity, happiness and joy to the world in whatever way possible!



We continue to learn from them everyday.

"I am so thankful for this opportunity to be here at this wonderful conference. For many years I felt life was unfair and that I had been dealt a bad deal. I suffered a lot and could only focus on my own troubles and myself. Then I did the YLTP * course... Now I work for society, my health has improved and my focus is: 'What can I do to make a better world?'

On holidays we teach the villagers about hygiene and cleanliness. We plant trees. Come to my school. I will be so happy to look after all of you and show you around."

Youth Leadership Training Programme (YLTP)

The Youth Leadership Training Program aims at training youngsters in a number of areas like health, hygiene, education, solid waste management, housekeeping etc. and channeling their energy and talents into mobilizing and strengthening people to work towards fulfilling their own community's needs.

Breath-Water-Sound

The Breath-Water-Sound teaches basic breathing techniques, satsangs and values of hygiene and harmony. Also called the Nav Chetana Shibir it has been enthusiastically received in the villages and slums, enabling one and all to find more harmony, joy and health.

Sri Sri Ravishankar Vidya Mandir (SSRVM)

Our Schools for underprivileged children focus on the child's over all personality development. The state curriculum is taught in English but students learn the local languages as well.


Rock Solid Power of Life!

At the conference, her performances had the entire crowd reveling in the sheer energy of her voice and music. 'Power of Life', the song she specially composed for the Women's Conference carried messages of 'Save the Girl Child', 'Global Warming', 'Women's Empowerment' and 'Shakti'. Over and over again, with this song, delegates reaffirmed their faith and belief that women can indeed change the world!



The Tejaswini Exhibition

Tejaswini is the inward journey towards perfection purification and peace. The Tejaswini exhitbition explained the five aspects of creation, creation being matter and consciousness and Shakti being the womb of all creation. Shakti is therefore expressed as the mother aspect of the Divine. Different functional aspects of this divine energy have different names and forms. A beautiful display of exquisite brass idols of Godesses depicting the different aspects of Shakit such as Durga, Lakshmi, Mahishasuramardini, Kali, Annapoorni, Meenakshi, Kamakshi and Vishalakshi was shown. The Tejaswini or the inward journey was depicted through the Sree Yantra, a symbolic representation of the Mother Goddess, a diagrammatic representation of the mantras.



Pre-Conference Objectives


As a build up to the conference, the Art of Living – International Association for Human Values (IAHV) pledged to:

Rehabilitate the lives of 1,000 women prisoners across the world

In prisons in Germany, Morocco, Indonesia, South Africa, Australia, India and many more countries, lives of women inmates have been transformed. In Bangalore, India, along with the Prison Programme, yoga training courses are also conducted at the Bangalore Central Jail. A vocational centre - agarbatti rolling, gift and handicraft manufacturing and tailoring - provides employment to the inmates. These products are now successfully marketed by the Art of Living under the brand name 'Punarnava' meaning 'New once again'. A computer training centre for the inmates has also been set up.

In Australia, the women reported that they were less stressed and drug dependant and were able to sleep better. In South Africa, courses were conducted in Leeukop, Boksburg, Pollsmore and in the Westville Maximum Security Prison in Kwazulu Natal. Women experienced greater understanding and value for life after going through the programme.

In Germany, one prison inmate said, "Finally I can rest. Thank you for that. Life now is beautiful." In Jakarta, Indonesia at the LP Wanita Tangerang women's prison, one prisoner reported, "Every night I have cried. Every day I have felt anger and frustrations. But now after the course I have accepted my situation and am happier now and can be a good mother to my children."



Pre-Conference Objectives

Educating 500 girls children in India.

At the Ved Vignan Maha Vidya Peeth, Bangalore, and the many rural and tribal schools across India, over 800 new girl students enrolled at the start of the new term.

At the VVMVP Rural School, 46% of the 2,500 students are girls. Shilpa, a student at the school, on receiving her 10th grade examination ticket, says, "For the first time I feel that women are not beneath men, that we are equals."

The first Sri Sri Vidya Mandir Tribal School was started in 1999 in the E. Singhbhum district, Jharkand. Today there are 69 tribal schools, including 5 slum schools, with 6084 students. Over 40% of the children are girls. The organisation is striving to make this a 50:50 ratio.

Kaushalya: A doctor in the making...

Kaushalya a resident of Prindrabad village situated near a Sri Sri Vidya Mandir school, Haludbani village, Jharkhand was like any other girl in that village with no opportunity to go to school because there was none near her village. Once Sri Sri Vidya Mandir was established in 2001, she was provided with that opportunity.

After five years she is emphatic and determined to become a doctor. Why? The prompt reply is "to serve my village". She proves her point that service to her people is life's aim as she now assists and counsels the KG class one-hour everyday before going to her higher school. The children love her because they feel a sense of belonging with someone from their own neighborhood who understands their language and is patient to relate to the problems of a first generation leaner. She has a perfect track record - she was always first in her class.

'Yaadien', a musical evening by Smt. Chitra Roy, was held on 13 may 2007 in New Delhi in aid of the 'Gift-A-Smile' project, sponsoring the education of rural children. The evening was a huge success with the event raising funds of nearly Rs. 20 lakh (US\$ 50,000)

Outcomes

Conference ends with a Commitment to Educate 10,000 girls

International Alliance of Women Leaders (IAWL) formed for Implementation of Outcomes

The three-day International Women's Conference culminated with a pledge to strengthen the intention and passion for resolving women's issues and challenges.

Pledge

Led by conference chairperson Smt. Bhanumathi Narasimhan, the delegates affirmed,

"Let us pledge to always keep alive the strength of our intention and passion to work towards resolving women's issues and challenges. Let us pledge to build networks globally and locally to search for relevant information on these issues and educate ourselves with tools to resolve them. Let us pledge to be committed to take concrete steps towards fulfilling our action plans."

INTERNATIONAL ALLIANCE OF WOMEN LEADERS (IAWL)

IAWL, a special group was constituted at the conference under the aegis of the International Association for Human values, with women representatives from 50 countries coming together. IAWL's primary aim is to empower women, from all walks of life, all across the globe.

It also aims to create an awareness that spirituality provides the inner strength required to life's challenges with a smile. Urban and rural poverty related issues will be tackled through a three-fold action plan comprising a strong literacy drive, vocational training, computer skills and marketing support.

Local Networks in the fifty participating countries would be formed, to address:

- » Education of the girl child
- » Female health
- » Environment conservation
- » Poverty eradication
- » Combating HIV/AIDS
- » Stopping domestic violence
- » Putting an end to female foeticide

Reference Groups would also be formed, which would be generic, reflecting common international issues such as:

- » Ethics & Leadership
- » Education
- » Health
- » Conflict Resolution
- » Refugee Women
- » Trauma Relief and Disaster Management
- » Indigenous Women and Children
- » Environment
- » Public Policy

Education of the Girl Child

Echoing the intention of the delegates, His Holiness Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, in his valedictory address, urged the each of the delegates to endeavor to educate at least 50 girl children each over the next six months. The call immediately resulted in action with 200 of the 550 delegates committing to provide education to at least 50 girl children each. That meant that one of IAWL's immediate goals of educating 10,000 girl children was accomplished on the very first day that the organisation was initiated.

Protecting the Environment

Each of the delegates was urged, on return to their own countries and homes to spread awareness and set examples for others in their communities to protect our planet and environment. Delegates were encouraged to plant more trees, reduce pollution and to be frugal in their fuel consumption.

Women Support

IAWL will continue to support women by initiating self-help groups, projects that provide employment, vocational training centres and other ventures to help sustain women living below the poverty line, across the globe.

Transforming Lives of Women Prisoners

Rehabilitation of women prisoners all over the world will continue as IAWL's ongoing project that was initiated at the first Women's Conference, 2005.

Building Homes, Securing Families

As part of the 'Model Village Project', IAWL will continue to construct homes that are registered to rural women and women who are economically challenged.

Joint Initiatives with UN Agencies

A series of issue-based *satsangs* or celebratory gatherings of music, knowledge and dance, and field-based projects in collaboration with UNICEF, UNIFEM and other similar agencies, are being conducted all over India. Issues such as female foeticide, child abandonment, gender inequity, HIV / AIDS and violence against women are focussed upon.

Child Support for 15 Zimbabwe Families

Children in Zimbabwe who have lost both parents to AIDS are now being supported by the Perth Art of Living chapter, Australia. This project was actualised immediately after the conference by delegates who attended the event.

All-India National NGO Summit

"Exploring Partnerships for Ecologically Sustainable Development"

As an outcome of the conference, an all-India summit will take place in December 2007 at the Art of Living International Centre in Bangalore, India. The summit aims to provide a platform for NGO's to interact on generating solutions and forming partnerships on the key environmental issues of the country.
